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General Marking Guidance

- All candidates must receive the same treatment. Examiners must mark the first candidate in exactly the same way as they mark the last.
- Mark schemes should be applied positively. Candidates must be rewarded for what they have shown they can do rather than penalised for omissions.
- Examiners should mark according to the mark scheme not according to their perception of where the grade boundaries may lie.
- There is no ceiling on achievement. All marks on the mark scheme should be used appropriately.
- All the marks on the mark scheme are designed to be awarded. Examiners should always award full marks if deserved, i.e. if the answer matches the mark scheme. Examiners should also be prepared to award zero marks if the candidate's response is not worthy of credit according to the mark scheme.
- Where some judgement is required, mark schemes will provide the principles by which marks will be awarded and exemplification may be limited.
- When examiners are in doubt regarding the application of the mark scheme to a candidate's response, the team leader must be consulted.
- Crossed out work should be marked UNLESS the candidate has replaced it with an alternative response.

Question Number	Indicative content Mark 6
20	 The aim here is for candidates to make a judgement as to whether a bank overdraft or trade credit is the most appropriate source of finance. There is no right answer and the candidate can argue that either method is best, depending on the circumstances. Candidates might consider the following possible ideas as part of their answer. Possible justifications for each: Bank overdraft Accessible – Liza as an existing relationship with the bank

		 Bank understands Liza's business – credit rating/history 	
		 Easy to arrange – as Liza only has to negotiate with one party 	
		 But high interest rates are charged on overdrafts and can therefore lead to higher fixed costs. This may worsen the cash flow position of the business. 	
		Overdrafts incur bank charges – additional costs for Liza	
		 Danger of reliance on overdraft rather than accurate financial planning 	
Trade creditEasy to arrange with individual suppliers			
		Can encourage relationships with suppliers	
		 Don't incur interest or charges that are associated with overdrafts if you stay within the credit terms 	
		 But may not provide enough cash to ensure the survival of the business – some may say yes, some may not 	
		 lose potential discounts for early payment – impact on cash flow 	
		 may have to negotiate with more than one supplier – this is a time issue
