

A level English coursework submission guidance

Changes for the June 2026 exam series and thereafter

You'll need to submit your centre coursework marks **before we release the list of students selected for the moderation sample**.

Once you've made your entries, submit your centre marks on Edexcel Online.

The Learner Work Transfer portal opens on **13 April 2026** for the June 2026 exam series.

If your centre marks are submitted before this date, your moderation sample will be available in the Learner Work Transfer from 13 April, and you can upload student work for moderation straight away.

If you submit your centre marks on or after 13 April, your moderation sample will appear in the Learner Work Transfer **within 6 hours**.

Entry deadline: 21 February (21 March for non-UK centres) each year.

Carrying forward coursework marks from a previous exam series

Students may carry forward coursework marks from a previous exam series using the T option code on entry. If a mark is being carried forward, there is no requirement to re-enter the mark on Edexcel Online and the student's work will not make up part of the sample.

Final date for submission of coursework marks and sample: 15 May each year.

What do I need to do?

- Mark and moderate students' coursework.
- Complete an [assessment record sheet](#) with AI declaration for each student.
- Inform students of the mark they have achieved prior to submission.
- Upload students' marks to Edexcel Online **after you have made entries** and print off a list of all marks entered before finalising your submission.
- From 13 April, the list of the students, including the highest- and lowest-scoring candidates in your sample will be listed on the LWT. **If you submit your centre marks on or after 13 April, your moderation sample will appear in Learner Work Transfer within 6 hours.** Upload one pdf per student in the 'Shared Files' section.
- If any of the called-for candidates have been withdrawn or have incomplete submissions, please provide additional candidates' work of a comparable level using the 'manage learners' function, and upload a covering note to your moderator on the LWT.

- Upload a print-out of the marks submitted for all students on Edexcel Online to the 'Administrative Material' section on the LWT.

Entering coursework marks on Edexcel Online after you have made entries

- Select 'GCE' qualification from the dropdown on the left
- Hover over 'Candidates'
- Select 'Search by Course'
- Select session 'June 2026' & 'Next'
- Click 'Papers' (far right) for 9ET0/9ENO or 9ELO
- Select the blue 'Coursework Marks' for the 'Written Coursework' option in the 'Paper Title' column
- Input marks in the 'marks' column for each candidate
- Click 'Print'
- Click 'Submit Marks'.

To enter marks you must have 'basic access' and 'Coursework and Portfolio' ticked on your Edexcel Online profile. If you don't have this, your exams officer can amend your profile.

The LWT is accessed on Edexcel Online. Samples can be uploaded from 13 April, provided you have entered your marks on Edexcel Online.

To assist moderators, please upload a single pdf per student, with the completed authentication sheet followed by the annotated coursework/the coursework followed by the marker/moderator comments sheet if you are using a separate sheet for annotations.

Informing candidates of their centre-assessed marks prior to submission

Candidates must be told the mark given by their centre for a centre-assessed component/unit. This requirement is to enable candidates to request a review of the centre's marking prior to the

marks being submitted to the awarding body, should they wish to do so. Please see the [JCQ guidance](#).

Do I need to carry out internal standardisation?

In large centres with multiple teachers, it's essential that you carry out internal moderation before you finalise the coursework marks. You should sample double-mark, selecting mark points within the same level from different teaching sets. The double marking should continue until you are satisfied that you have achieved comparability.

Small schools with only one teacher need not carry out internal standardisation. It is helpful to upload a covering note to the LWT with your sample explaining that you are in this situation.

How should I annotate the work?

It's important that you annotate the coursework to show the moderator how you have interpreted the mark scheme and applied it to the students' work. Marginal annotation noting how and how well a particular Assessment Objective has been met is useful. Teachers should avoid excessive ticking without commentary. Equally, simply noting 'AO2' in the margin does not help the moderator understand the teacher's evaluation of the quality of the work perceived by the marker. The first marker and second marker/moderator may annotate in different colours to differentiate their comments. Please ensure that the audience for your comments is clearly the moderator rather than the student. Moderators are best able to confirm teachers' marks when the annotation clearly explains the markers' thought processes.

What are the grade boundaries?

You should not attempt to grade the work; you should be marking the work by applying the mark scheme in a consistent manner.

Coursework grades are awarded at the end of each examination series using the standard code of practice awarding process.

Grade boundaries, which are subject to change each exam series, are published on the [grade boundaries page](#) of our website. We publish notional component grade boundaries and actual grade boundaries.

There is some [scaling](#) on our A levels (although not on the coursework component) and you should bear this in mind when consulting grade boundaries. You can use the [scaling calculator](#) to help you.

Please also remember that the mark you submit to us should be the total raw mark.

A score of zero should only be used if a candidate has submitted work that is found to meet none of the assessment criteria. An X should be used for any candidate who is absent.

Word counts, titles, quotations and bibliographies

Please see the specification guidance at the beginning of each coursework unit which gives clear information on word counts. Titles, bibliographies and footnotes (that are references rather than content) are not included in word counts. Quotations are included. **Word counts are advisory and there is no penalty for exceeding them.**
