Overview

The animal management sector

The animal management sector is rapidly developing from a low-grade, largely manual sector into a service industry meeting the broad demands of the animal-owning and interested public. Animal care is worth £1 billion to the UK economy. This sector has 20,000 businesses, 78,000 employees and many volunteers. There are many different career paths and opportunities for those wishing to work in animal management which range from working with small to large, domesticated and exotic animals in subsector areas such animal welfare, business, science and wildlife conservation.

Who is this qualification for?

This qualification is intended as a Tech Level, equivalent in size to 1.5 A levels and, as such, is designed to meet the Tech Bacc measure, when studied alongside level 3 mathematics and the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ).

It provides a one-year full-time course that is a comprehensive introduction to the sector, and is primarily for students intending to gain employment directly, or progress to an apprenticeship or a higher-level animal management qualification.

No prior study of the sector is needed, but students should normally have a range of achievement at level 2, in GCSEs or equivalent qualifications.

What does the qualification cover?

The content of this qualification has been developed in consultation with employers and professional bodies to confirm that the content is appropriate for those interested in working in the sector. In addition, HE representatives have been involved to ensure that it supports entry to the relevant range of specialist degrees.

The qualification develops the knowledge, understanding and skills that provide an excellent basis for employment or for further education.

There are six mandatory units, which cover the following aspects of animal management:

- animal welfare, including ethics, practical animal husbandry and animal behaviour
- animal science, including animal biology, and animal health and diseases.

There are also units covering personal and self-development, including an investigative research project and work experience.

The mandatory units are as follows:

- Unit 2: Animal Biology
- Unit 3: Animal Welfare and Ethics
- Unit 4: Practical Animal Husbandry
- Unit 5: Animal Behaviour
- Unit 6: Animal Health and Disease
- Unit 7: Work Experience in the Animal Sector

Students will be able to add one option unit to the mandatory content. The option units have been designed to support progression to a range of employment opportunities in the animal management sector and, when taken alongside other level 3 qualifications, to a range higher education courses.

Option units introduce students to a sector specialist area of their choice, including working in particular environments, and link with relevant occupational areas. The option units cover areas such as zoological and wildlife centres/parks, farms, retailing and business, grooming and animal nursing. Students will work with different types of animals, from small to large domesticated and exotic animals, which will prepare the students for sector specialist areas.

All students taking this qualification will be required to engage with sector employers as part of their course, including 150 hours work experience with an employer in the sector, where opportunities will be given to develop practical skills in preparation for employment.

What could this qualification lead to?

Will the qualification lead to employment, if so, in which job role and at which level?

This qualification is designed primarily to support progression to employment in support roles in the animal management sector, for example:

- animal care assistant
- animal nursing assistant
- dog grooming assistant
- zoo/wildlife trainee keeper
- animal charity fundraiser
- small and large animal handler
- animal training assistant
- fish keeper.

If taken alongside additional qualifications such as:

- Pearson BTEC Level 3 90-credit Diploma in Agriculture, it may support entry to livestock assistant roles
- Pearson BTEC Level 3 Foundation Diploma in Business, it may support entry to administrative or assistant roles in a pet retail or kennel and cattery environment.

Students can access roles such as an animal care worker in sanctuaries, charities, or laboratories, a wildlife conservation worker, or as staff in animal-related businesses, or city farms.

Students may be able to take on more supervisory roles, or roles with greater responsibility, or seek employment through an animal management apprenticeship.

Will the qualification support progression to further learning, if so, what to?

Students who have completed this qualification in a year may progress to further learning at level 3; for example, a second BTEC Foundation Diploma in a complementary sector, or to a larger size BTEC National in Animal Management.

When achieved alongside other level 3 qualifications as part of a two-year programme of learning, students will be able to progress to a range of degree programmes in the animal management sector.

The qualification is intended to carry UCAS points and is recognised by HE providers as contributing to meeting admission requirements to many relevant courses. For example, if taken alongside AS/A Levels in Biology and Chemistry, it could lead to a:

- BSc (Hons) in Veterinary Science
- BSc (Hons) in Veterinary Nursing
- BSc (Hons) in Animal Management
- BSc (Hons) in Agriculture
- BSc (Hons) in Zoology
- BSc (Hons) in Animal Science.

The qualification could also lead to:

- BSc (Hons) Wildlife Conservation, if taken alongside AS/A Level Environmental Science and Biology
- BSc (Hons) Animal Behaviour, if taken alongside AS/A Level Biology and Psychology
- BSc (Hons) Business Management, if taken alongside AS/A Level Business Studies and Applied Business.

Students should always check the entry requirements for degree programmes at specific HE providers.

If there are larger and/or smaller versions of this qualification, or it is available at different skills levels, why should the student choose this one?

The **Pearson BTEC Level 3 National Foundation Diploma in Animal Management** is equivalent in size to 1.5 A levels and is for students looking for a one-year course, perhaps after taking further level 2 qualifications, and who are intending to gain employment directly, or progress onto an apprenticeship in animal management.

The suite also includes the following qualifications.

The **Pearson BTEC Level 3 National Extended Certificate in Animal Management** is the smallest qualification in the suite of BTEC Nationals in Animal Management and is equivalent in size to 1 A level. It is for students interested in learning about the animal management sector, with supplementing fields of study. For example, if taken alongside A levels in Biology and Chemistry, it will allow for alternative progression routes into areas such as veterinary science.

The **Pearson BTEC Level 3 National Diploma in Animal Management** is equivalent in size to 2 A levels and is principally for students wanting to progress directly into work such as an animal management assistant, or supervisor. Its size means there is time in a study programme to take an additional level 3 qualification to support progression to more specialist employment.

The **Pearson BTEC Level 3 National Extended Diploma in Animal Management with Science** is equivalent in size to 3 A levels and has additional mandatory and optional science content. It is for students who know they want to work in the animal management sector, either directly or following a sector-related degree.
