Riley works full time and is also taking a course that they hope will get them a better job in the future. They mostly study in the evening after work. At weekends, Riley volunteers at a local charity shop. They are finding working, studying, volunteering and home life hard, causing them stress. Riley loves to go shopping and thinks this is a way of coping with their stress. They are in a long-term relationship and have started to argue with their partner. The arguing increases Riley's stress levels, so they shop even more. They told their mother about their shopping. Riley's mother laughed and suggested that shopping must run in the family. She often spends a lot of money on shoes and has dozens of pairs.

- 1** The cognitive approach suggests that the maintenance of a behavioural addiction can be explained by cognitive biases.

Define cognitive bias.

The smell of the perfume and seeing all the displays just made me remember how happy I felt shopping and made me want to buy things".*

She saw a car coming towards her but could not move out of the way fast enough. Her heart rate increased, and she began to sweat. She was not hurt but could not concentrate or eat that day.

Identify, from the scenario, **two** signs which show that Johanna's SAM pathway has been activated.
