



Although not in the core of a Traineeship, you and the employer have the flexibility to offer vocational qualifications.Learners with learning difficulties and/or disabilities (LLDD) may be on a non-accredited course or working towards a qualification.Qualifications The Pearson Personal Progress and Skills for Independence and Work qualifications provide a structured programme introducing learners to vocational learning.Structured framework Qualifications can be an effective motivator for learners enabling them to see their progress through the framework of a qualification.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">English and maths is a core element in every 16-19 Study Programme and Traineeship. All 16-18 year olds who haven't a GCSE at grade C or above in these subjects are expected to continue to study towards them.Learners with learning difficulties and/or disabilities (LLDD) will be excluded from the English and maths requirement where appropriate.Stepping stones Qualifications other than GCSEs are seen by the government as 'stepping stone' qualifications on the journey towards achieving GCSEs.Bite sized qualifications At Entry Level 1 it may be more appropriate to consider bite sized qualifications developing English, maths and ICT skills from the Pearson offer.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Work experience, supported internships, or other work related learning or activities designed to help students secure work experience, job related or specialist skills of direct benefit to their future employment or study goals.Learners on a 16-19 Study Programme who are not yet ready to study and achieve substantial qualifications at level 2, may include substantial work experience as a core element.Traineeships are suitable for learners who are ready for the world of work, an Apprenticeship or a full-time study programme within six months of engaging in the traineeship.Supported internship If appropriate, this may be an option where provider and employer work in partnership to provide substantial work experience.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Work preparation can be part of a 16-19 Study Programme, either as a qualification, or as other activity. Work preparation is the final core element of a Traineeship. It can be accredited or non-accredited learning and the aim is to focus on the needs of the learner. It could for example encompass aspects such as CV writing, interview preparation, job search and interpersonal skills.Protected work experience placement If a provider assesses the learner as having significant support needs they can organise a protected work experience placement within their own organisation doing 'live' work, giving the learner the opportunity to experience a real working environment for example, in a college restaurant, retail shop, or car maintenance garage. (Protected work experience placements cannot be used as part of a Traineeship).	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Both 16-19 Study Programmes and Traineeships give you the flexibility to offer other activities alongside the core elements.Other activities need to be planned, organised and timetabled by the institution and delivered within the normal working pattern.Tutorial Regular 1-1 tutorials can help you check on progress and achievement, and regular group tutorials can help you check on progress in working with others.On-the-job-coaching and ongoing visits to employer to check on progress made can help you track how learners are progressing.Group working Project based activities can encourage working with others and develop enterprise and entrepreneurial skills.
