

- This is the shorter question and is worth a total of 15 marks.
 - 9 marks are available for composition.
 - 6 marks are available for SPaG.
- This learner would score a total of 11 marks.
 - 7 marks for composition, a top band answer
 - It answers the question clearly and with the appropriate detail. The structure is good, but there are issues with sentences and accuracy.
 - 4 marks for SPaG, a middle band answer.
 - There are some incomplete sentences and some spelling mistakes, but some positive examples of spelling too.
