Founder of the UK's first independent software house




Dina St Johnston was a ground-breaking computer programmer who founded the UK's first software house in 1959. Despite leaving school early, she worked at the British Non-Ferrous Metals Research Association and studied part-time at Croydon Polytechnic and Sir John Cass College. Dina then joined Elliott Brothers Ltd., where she helped develop a computer to calculate missile trajectories. To enhance her skills, she took a programming course at Cambridge, where she excelled.

In 1959, Dina founded Vaughan Programming Services, marking the start of the independent software industry in the UK. Her exceptional skills were admired by all. Dina went on to develop software for major companies like the BBC and Unilever, as well as flight simulators for the RAF. Her career is a testament to how passion, dedication, and innovation can shape the future of technology and inspire others to pursue their dreams.
