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# GCSE English Language and GCSE English Literature

## Two Year Planner – Option 2

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This route is most suitable for schools wishing to cover the bulk of the Literature reading in class, or for those classes needing a concentrated focus on only one area of the English curriculum at one time.

Autumn 1	<p><b>Writing skills</b> – suggest one lesson per week to develop/maintain writing skills, particularly AO6 and generation of ideas.</p>	<p><b>Poetry Anthology</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Introduce poetry anthology.</li> <li>• Develop analytical terminology for AO2.</li> <li>• Once students are confident with AO2 terminology, begin to develop comparison and context themes.</li> </ul>	<p><i>Spoken language preparation is an excellent area from which to set independent research/presentation projects. Autumn 2		<p><b>Poetry – finish anthology and use poems from another collection for unseen preparation</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Develop exam technique for approaching unseen poetry to cover all aspects of L/F/S.</li> <li>• Introduce large variety of poetic styles/genres/forms to build confidence.</li> <li>• Develop comparison skills using appropriate terminology.</li> </ul>

Spring 1	<p><b>Reading – develop AO3 focus for non-fiction</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Introduce ‘writer’s perspective’ as key term.</li> <li>• Introduce comparison as specific skill and begin with audience and form, then perspective, then build up to aspects of F/S/L.</li> <li>• Use short paragraphs, then longer extracts to build confidence.</li> </ul>	<p><i>Revision of texts – one lesson per week</i></p>	<p><b>Final assessment for Spoken Language certificate</b> – use as opportunity to encourage students to become experts in Literature/Language exam areas, or give them areas of exam papers to teach/present to class.</p>
Spring 2	<p><b>Writing from reading – bring the AOs together</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Use weekly themes to encourage student use of reading material as stimuli for writing, use wide variety of forms and audiences.</li> <li>• Encourage students to find own extracts and prepare questions for class.</li> <li>• Revise and develop key terminology bank for AO2 – use for both reading and writing.</li> <li>• Model ‘critical style’ and develop phrase bank for exam answers.</li> <li>• Revise and refine AO6 skills/vocab bank.</li> <li>• Encourage ‘mining’ of reading material for writing styles/vocabulary/rhetorical devices/ideas.</li> </ul>	<p><i>Continue revision of texts, one lesson per week</i></p>

## Assessment Objectives for GCSE English Language

Reading – 50%

<b>AO2</b> 10–20%	Explain, comment on and analyse how writers use language and structure to achieve effects and influence readers, using relevant subject terminology to support their views
<b>AO3</b> 5–10%	Compare writers' ideas and perspectives, as well as how these are conveyed, across two or more texts
<b>AO4</b> 10–20%	Evaluate texts critically and support this with appropriate textual references

<b>AO5</b> 30%	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Communicate clearly, effectively and imaginatively, selecting and adapting tone, style and register for different forms, purposes and audiences</li> <li>Organise information and ideas, using structural and grammatical features to support coherence and cohesion of texts</li> </ul>
<b>AO6</b> 20%	Candidates must use a range of vocabulary and sentence structures for clarity, purpose and effect, with accurate spelling and punctuation
Spoken Language – separate endorsement	
<b>AO7</b>	Demonstrate presentation skills in a formal setting
<b>AO8</b>	Listen and respond appropriately to spoken language, including to questions and feedback to presentations
