Section A <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Response to unseen 20th/21st century texts (one non-fiction and one literary non-fiction). Including comparison between the two texts. Section B <ul style="list-style-type: none"> One transactional writing task from a choice of two. Linked to the theme of the reading text in Section A. Includes marks for vocab, spelling, punctuation and grammar.

Key Similarities

This can be simply carried over. 	
Key benefits of the Pearson Edexcel Specification	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The 19th century extract is always a fictional text, allowing crossover with GCSE Literature One transactional writing task, rather than two Photo prompts for creative writing to support students The writing tasks are all linked to the theme of the Reading section of the paper.

Post-1914 Literature <ul style="list-style-type: none"> One essay question on chosen Post-1914 play or novel. An extract is given in the paper and students must refer to the whole play/novel. 19th-century prose <ul style="list-style-type: none"> One essay question focussing on the extract given in the paper and on the whole novel. Unseen poetry <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Two questions on unseen poems from the 20th and/or 21st century. One of the questions will ask students to compare the two poems. 	19th-century novel <ul style="list-style-type: none"> One essay question with two parts, one focussing on the extract given in the paper and the other on the whole novel. Poetry <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Two questions: one comparing two poems from the Anthology and the other comparing two unseen contemporary poems.

Key Similarities <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Choice of texts Shakespeare and 19th century novel question has same requirement – one part of the question based on a given extract and the other part on the whole text. 	
Key benefits of the Pearson Edexcel Specification <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A choice of question for the Post-1914 Literature Short quotation given in Post-1914 question rather than a longer extract Poetry – seen and unseen is all assessed together in one exam paper One question on unseen poetry, rather than two Shorter examination.
