
Marketing manager

Question types

- · Short and open-response Reading questions.
- Writing tasks.

How is content split across the papers?

- For GCSE English Language 1ENO, the first paper is on Fiction and Imaginative Writing and the second paper is on Non-Fiction and Transactional Writing. For both papers there is a reading section and a choice of writing tasks which are linked by a theme.
- For GCSE English Language 2.0, the first paper is on Non-Fiction Texts and the second paper is on Contemporary Texts. For both papers there is a reading section and a choice of writing tasks.
- For GCSE English Literature, the first paper is on Shakespeare and Post-1914 Literature and the second paper is on 19th-century Novel and Poetry since 1789. For both papers, students will answer a question about an extract and the whole text for their chosen set text.
