<ul> <li>Poetry <ul> <li>Two questions: one comparing a poem from the Anthology with an unseen poem and the other a related question on a different poem from the Anthology.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Shakespeare <ul> <li>One question from a choice of two, based either on an extract given in the paper or the whole play.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	<ul> <li>19th-century novel</li> <li>One essay question with two parts, one focussing on the extract given in the paper and the other on the whole novel.</li> <li>Poetry</li> <li>Two questions: one comparing two poems from the Anthology and the other comparing two unseen contemporary poems.</li> </ul>

- Unseen extracts from 19th, 20th and 21st centuries to assess reading
