<p>Paper 1: Exploring modern and literary heritage texts 2 hours (50%)</p> <p>Modern Prose or Drama</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> One essay question on chosen play or novel. Question is split into two parts. Part a) a comparison of an extract from the studied text with an unseen modern prose extract and b) a related question on the text studied. <p>19th-century prose</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> One essay question from a choice of two: an extract-based question making links with the text as a whole or a discursive question. 	<p>Paper 1: Shakespeare and Post-1914 Literature 1 hour 45 minutes (50%)</p> <p>Shakespeare</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> One essay question with two parts, one focussing on the extract given in the paper and the other on the whole play. <p>Post-1914 Literature</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> One essay question on chosen play or novel from a choice of two. A quotation from the text is given and students must refer to context.
<p>Paper 2: Exploring poetry and Shakespeare 2 hours (50%)</p> <p>Poetry</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Two questions: one comparing a poem from the Anthology with an unseen poem and the other a related question on a different poem from the Anthology. <p>Shakespeare</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> One question from a choice of two, based either on an extract given in the paper or the whole play. 	<p>Paper 2: 19th-century Novel and Poetry 2 hours 15 minutes (50%)</p> <p>19th-century novel</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> One essay question with two parts, one focussing on the extract given in the paper and the other on the whole novel. <p>Poetry</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Two questions: one comparing two poems from the Anthology and the other comparing two unseen contemporary poems.
<p>Texts</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Shakespeare: Macbeth, Romeo and Juliet, Much Ado About Nothing, The Merchant of Venice Modern text: Inspector Calls, Animal Farm, Anita and Me, DNA, Never Let Me Go, My Mother Said I Never Could 19th century novel: Jane Eyre, Great Expectations, Jekyll and Hyde, Pride and Prejudice, The War of the Worlds. 	<p>Texts</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Shakespeare: Macbeth, Romeo and Juliet, Much Ado About Nothing, Twelfth Night, The Merchant of Venice, The Tempest Post 1914 British play/novel: Inspector Calls, Animal Farm, Anita and Me, Hobson's Choice, Blood Brothers, Journey's End, Lord of the Flies, The Woman in Black, The Empress, Refugee Boy 19th century novel: Jane Eyre, Great Expectations, Jekyll and Hyde, Pride and Prejudice, Christmas Carol, Silas Marner, Frankenstein, , Boys Don't Cry, Coram Boy.
<p>Key Similarities</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Choice of texts Poetry – can study the 'relationships', 'conflict' or 'time and place' cluster of poems. 	
<p>Key benefits of the Pearson Edexcel Specification</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> No unseen element to the modern text question allowing more familiarity in the exam A choice of question for each text in the Post-1914 literature.

Paper 2: Exploring effects and impact 2 hours (50%)	Paper 2 Non-fiction and Transactional Writing 2 hours 5 mins (60%)
<p>Section A</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Reading two unseen 20th/21st century literary prose texts, one of which may be non-fiction. Responding to a range of question types. <p>Section B</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> One imaginative writing task from a choice of two. Linked to the theme of the reading text in Section A. Includes marks for vocab, spelling, punctuation and grammar. 	<p>Section A</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Response to unseen 20th/21st century texts (one non-fiction and one literary non-fiction). Including comparison between the two texts. <p>Section B</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> One transactional writing task from a choice of two. Linked to the theme of the reading text in Section A. Includes marks for vocab, spelling, punctuation and grammar.
