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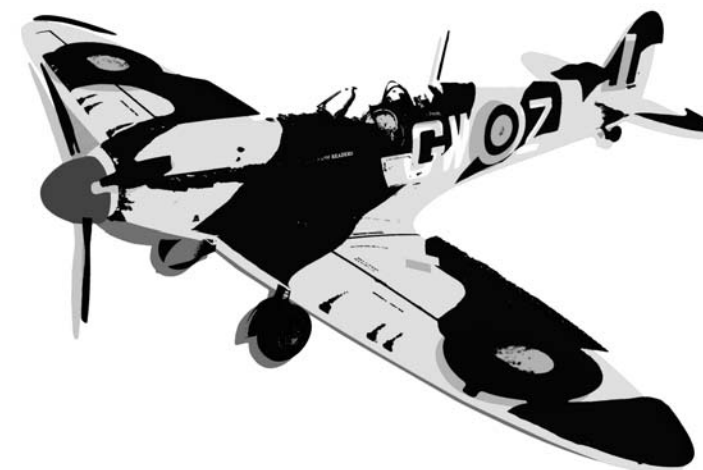

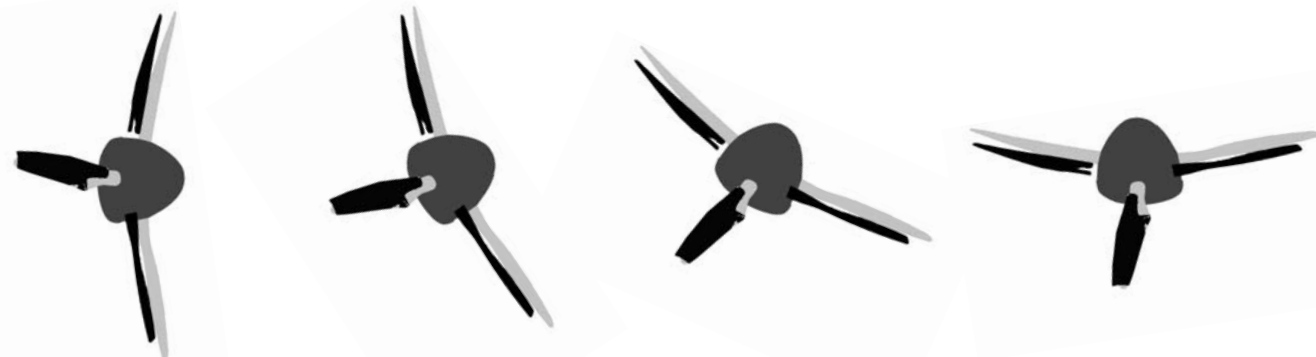
What will I learn?

Your teacher can show you some examples to help you practice and succeed. • Examiners want you to do well and will be looking for comments to reward rather than looking to spot mistakes or gaps in your knowledge. • Many of the questions will be like those you have already done in Key Stages 3 and 4. There will be questions which ask you what you know and have learnt, and other questions which are more about your own opinions and letting you give your own explanations and reasons for something that happened in the past. 	<p>This is task based around an issue in history and will be written up in lesson times. You will carry out some research, analyse an aspect of the issue and then discuss different ways in which it has been represented.</p>

Lenin Trotsky

The Leaders
of the Revolution



These photographs were published in Russia. They show the same event during the Russian Revolution, the celebration of the second anniversary of the Revolution in October 1919.

What has changed? Trotsky is missing in the second photography, which was the version used in Russia from the 1930s until the 1980s. Trotsky was an enemy of Stalin, who came to power after Lenin. Stalin wanted people to forget how important Trotsky has been, so he 'disappeared' from the photos.

This is just one example of the ways governments and the media try to change what you think – you'll spot plenty more on the course.
