THREATS TO SEA LIFE

Loss of habitat and sea life is often overlooked because we cannot

THREATS FROM FISHING

Better [22.] have led to huge increases in fish being caught since the 1930s.

Changes which have threatened sea life:

- 1930s – Fishermen followed [23.] to find fish.
- 1950s – Sonar used to make locating fish easier. Catches increased.
- 1960s – Large vessels called [24.] are introduced.
Catches increased significantly.
- 1970s – Huge nets with ‘hoover’ pipes introduced. Catches continued to grow.
- 1980s – Some fish species found to be in danger
- 1990s – Deep sea fishing introduced using heavy equipment.

Nets and [25.] are dragged over the sea floor.

Today, deep water fish are under threat because their [26.] makes them vulnerable to overfishing.



THREATS FROM POLLUTION

Sources of pollution:

- Shipping accidents resulting in oil spills.
- Activities on land:
 - Agricultural practices
The main source of pollution is from [27.] which enter the waterways.
