Q6: The candidates are required to write the text for a leaflet aimed at school students offering advice on how to deal with bullying.

Script	Commentaries	Mark
S1	This is a rather brief response but within it there is a clear sense of purpose and clear communication. The use of a heading indicates a suitable form; tone and register are also appropriate but brevity keeps this at the lower end of Level 3 for AO4. Whilst ideas are not developed, they are connected. There is use of a varied vocabulary and some range of punctuation.	AO4 L3 – 13 marks AO5 L3 – 9 marks
S2	The candidate communicates successfully in this lively and engaging response that demonstrates a secure realisation of purpose and understanding of the needs of the intended reader. The heading and effective use of bullet points help to convey ideas successfully. The vocabulary has been carefully selected and there is a good degree of technical accuracy.
