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General marking guidance

- All candidates must receive the same treatment. Examiners must mark the last candidate in exactly the same way as they mark the first.
- Mark schemes should be applied positively. Candidates must be rewarded for what they have shown they can do, rather than be penalised for omissions.
- Examiners should mark according to the mark scheme – not according to their perception of where the grade boundaries may lie.
- All the marks on the mark scheme are designed to be awarded. Examiners should always award full marks if deserved, i.e. if the answer matches the mark scheme. Examiners should be prepared to award zero marks if the candidate's response is not worthy of credit according to the mark scheme.
- Where some judgement is required, mark schemes will provide the principles by which marks will be awarded and exemplification/indicative content will not be exhaustive.
- When examiners are in doubt regarding the application of the mark scheme to a candidate's response, a senior examiner must be consulted before a mark is given.
- Crossed-out work should be marked **unless** the candidate has replaced it with an alternative response.

Marking guidance for levels-based mark schemes

How to award marks

The indicative content provides examples of how students will meet each skill assessed in the question. The levels descriptors and indicative content reflect the relative weighting of each skill within each mark band.

Finding the right level

The first stage is to decide which level the answer should be placed in. To do this, use a 'best-fit' approach, deciding which level most closely describes the quality of the answer. Answers can display characteristics from more than one level, and where this happens, markers must use the guidance below and their professional judgement to decide which level is most appropriate.

Placing a mark within a level

After a level has been decided on, the next stage is to decide on the mark within the level. The instructions below tell you how to reward responses within a level. However, where a level has specific guidance about how to place an answer within a level, always follow that guidance. Statements relating to the treatment of students who do not fully meet the requirements of the question are also shown in the indicative content section of each levels-based mark scheme. These statements should be considered alongside the levels descriptors.

Markers should be prepared to use the full range of marks available in a level and not restrict marks to the middle. Markers should start at the middle of the level (or the upper-middle mark if there is an even number of marks) and then move the mark up or down to find the best mark. To do this, they should take into account how far the answer meets the requirements of the level:

- if it meets the requirements fully, markers should be prepared to award full marks within the level. The top mark in the level is used for answers that are as good as can realistically be expected within that level
- if it only barely meets the requirements of the level, markers should consider awarding marks at the bottom of the level. The bottom mark in the level is used for answers that are the weakest that can be expected within that level
- the middle marks of the level are used for answers that have a reasonable match to the descriptor. This might represent a balance between some characteristics of the level that are fully met and others that are only barely met.

Relevant points may include: AO3 • In 1798 Thomas Malthus published 'An Essay on the Principle of Population. This was a pessimistic view on the relationship between population and resources. It outlined how food supply could be increased with greater use of land but that it would only grow arithmetically while population growth would increase geometrically. • Malthus predicted that over time population growth would outstrip resources creating a Malthusian catastrophe or point of crisis. • In 1965 Ester Boserup published a more optimistic view on the relationship between population and resources. She argued that human innovation would allow humans to produce sufficient food. • These innovations could be driven by finding new resources, the development of new technologies (such as those in the Green Revolution), advances in agricultural techniques, and more efficient production processes. AO4 • Figure 1c shows how Malthus thought population would outstrip food resources over time. • Figure 1c shows how Malthus had a pessimistic outlook predicting a catastrophe caused by population growth. • Figure 1c shows how Ester Boserup thought that food supply would grow in stages to be higher than population growth.

Relevant points may include: A03 - There are various elements to supporting the sustainability of living in rural areas including food and water, alongside housing conditions, education and employment opportunities. - For countries with high dependence on agriculture, efforts to improve crop yields are important for earning income and food security. - Application of fertilisers have been key to improve crop yields and supporting rural livelihoods (as seen in the Green Revolution in India/Pakistan). - If households can produce higher yields, it means they may be able to move beyond subsistence agriculture to earn profits which can be reinvested in equipment or used for family members to access healthcare/education, reducing the potential for experiences of poverty. A04 - Figure 2c shows there is a positive correlation between the use of fertilisers and crop yield for African countries. - Figure 2c shows how countries such as Gambia use less than 0.1kg per hectare, which leads to very low cereal yields (around 0.5 tonnes per hectare). - Figure 2c shows how countries such as Egypt use around over 100 kg per hectare of fertilisers and have crop yields around 7.5 tonnes per hectare.

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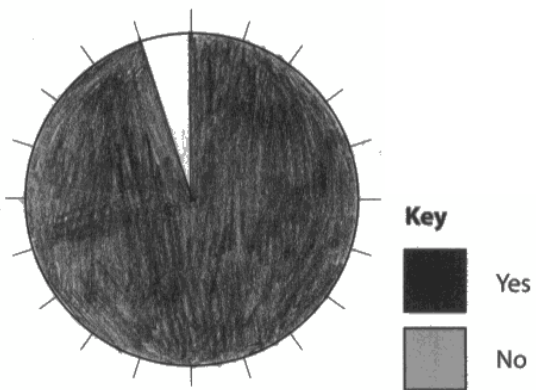

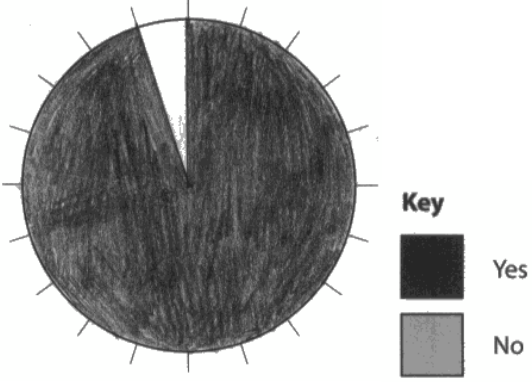

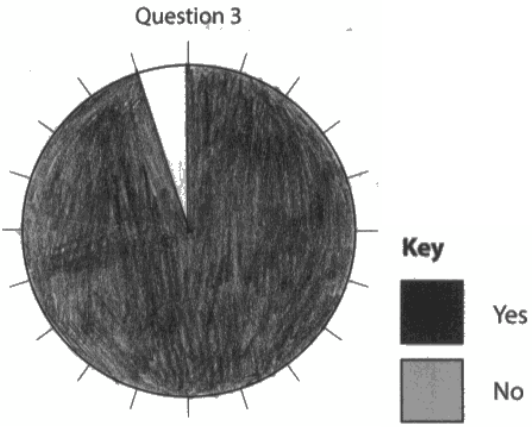

	• Different factors contribute to the development of a country / region: cultural, technological, social, economic as well as wider measures such as stability and water availability. • International aid is given to countries (sometimes via grants or loans) to support development which could be through investment infrastructure, industry or a specific sector, or to contribute to debt relief. This is often coordinated through organisations such as the World Bank or IMF as part of international collaborations, but can also be between countries. • While top down development approaches focus on the actions of governments and international organisations, bottom up approaches tend to be smaller in scale and involve local communities and organisations. A03 • Top down projects often led by international agencies or government organisations often focus on economic investment/debt, large scale infrastructure or systems that can help foster economic development with the benefits trickling down through regions to local people. These are not always the most appropriate methods for tackling the development gap. • E.g. The Nigeria Coastal railway designed to link up major cities and settlements near the coast, and encourage development in the delta. • Bottom-up development projects usually involve more grassroots based approaches, focusing on helping people improve their lives.
