


# **Understanding Plagiarism Practical Application**

2. You are studying Health and Social Care and have been asked to read a report on Dementia Care in the Community and write a summary report. You do not find reading easy and so you look on the internet for similar reports. Having found two articles you cut and paste information from both and create your own report. You add your own introduction and summary paragraph, but do not change anything else.

3. Your brother studied Level 3 Sport two years ago and got a distinction grade; he was always praised for his written work. You have been given an assignment to do for Sport Psychology a topic which you find difficult. Also, due to some recent illness you are close to the deadline; in desperation you find your brother's assignment and submit it as your own.

4. You have carried out extensive research for an assignment and have found an awesome quote you want to use to prove the argument you are putting forward. You add this to your assignment using speech marks, you reference it in the body of the text and also list it in your bibliography.

5. You are preparing a report on leadership styles and have been asked to include John Adair's Action-Centred Leadership. The website you have found the best explanation is British Library, <a href="https://www.bl.uk/people/john-adair">www.bl.uk/people/john-adair</a>. The excerpt you want to reference is;

"Action-Centred Leadership

This simple and practical model is figuratively based on three overlapping circles. These represent the task, the team and the individual. The model seems to endure well, probably because it is the fundamental model for describing what leaders have to do, the actions they must take whatever their working environment, in order to be effective:

- 1. Achieve the task
- 2. Build and maintain the team
- 3. Develop the individual

Task, team and individual: Adair's concept asserts that the three needs of task, team and individual are the watchwords of leadership, as people expect their leaders to help them achieve the common task, build the synergy of teamwork, and respond to individuals' needs"

### This is what you have included in your assignment.

John Adair's action-centred leadership model shows that a leader must recognise that there are three elements that require consideration for a team to be successful. The three elements are, the task, the individual and the team. Success can be achieved when each of these are working independently, however when there is acceptance of a common task and cooperation and development amongst the individuals more can be achieved and the leader can develop a high functioning team (British Library, Business and management, <a href="https://www.bl.uk/people/john-adair">www.bl.uk/people/john-adair</a>).

6. You have been asked to give a presentation on tourist locations in London. You have looked for information on. You have decided to include the London Eye in your presentation. The TravelandTour World website says;

### In your presentation you have written

"The London Eye is a tourist attraction standing alongside the River Thames. You will see some of London's best views from its 32 capsules, each capsule holds up to 25 people. When you climb aboard you will have a breathtaking experience, with an unforgettable perspective of more than 55 of London's most famous landmarks – all in just 30 minutes!"

7. Jasmine, a BTEC Sport student, had always found nutrition class challenging. The Macro/micronutrient values, amounts and types never seemed to stick. With the first assignment deadline looming, panic set in. The assignment? "Discuss the role that Macro/Micronutrients play in athletic performance."

Recalling how her friends used ChatGPT for various tasks in previous units, she decided to use it for her assignment. She asked ChatGPT, "Tell me about how Macro/Micronutrients can impact on athletic performance." ChatGPT delivered a detailed, well-structured response.

Instead of taking notes, processing the information, or rephrasing it in her own words, Jasmine directly copied and pasted the Al's response onto her assignment, made minor tweaks to the paragraphs, and submitted it.

8. Ethan, a student on a BTEC in Animal Management, was knee-deep in an animal husbandry assignment about handling and moving animals. Though he had his BTEC textbook, class notes and practical experience, there were still gaps in his understanding. He turned to ChatGPT for help.

He asked, "Can you explain safe animal handling techniques for different animals?" The response was thorough and gave him a better understanding of the topic.

Instead of copying the information verbatim, Ethan summarized the main points in his own words. When incorporating specific facts or particularly well-phrased segments from ChatGPT's response, he made sure to attribute the source. At the end of his assignment, he included a reference section:

ChatGPT (2023). Safe animal handling techniques for different animals.
